1. President Bernardo's trip to the U.S. Pres. Bernardo informed the Board that Leyte Governor Benjamin Romualdez requested him to proceed to Washington, D.C. to help in making preparations for the state visit of Pres. Marcos to the United States. His particular assignment was on the area of agriculture and academic programs. In the U.S., he met with Senator Percy and staff, vice presidents and deans of some U.S. universities and important USAID officials.

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His discussions with USAID officials dealt on areas of interest in the Philippines such as products utilization and processing, including marketing problems. Pres. Bernardo observed that the Filipinos have the capacity to increase production in the farms but the disposal/marketing of their products pose a great problem.

In the area of agro-forestry, reforestation of denuded areas 16
was considered a serious problem. 17

Pres. Bernardo reported that he also prepared a proposal to 18 improve agricultural extension which Gov. Romualdez would like to 19 start implementing in the Philippines as a pilot project of the 20 ASEAN.

PROPOSAL TO OFFER A NON-THESIS OPTION FOR BSA MAJOR IN PLANT PROTECTION

RATIONALE

The Department of Plant Protection aims to provide its students the kind of training best suited for the employment opportunities in their field. At present, BSA graduates major in Plant Protection, are getting employed as researchers and toachers in various government and private agencies. Even if the demand for them cannot even be filled up, there is a pressing necessity to train a special breed of plant protection graduates that certain institutions and agencies require in their employ. The present training of our major students cannot adequately take care of these needs. For instance, the Ministry of Agriculture would like graduates who are well versed in various aspects about insects, plant diseases, weeds and rats to act as pest control officers in its numerous field activities. Such personnel need not conduct the actual research themselves but they should be knowledgeable about the mechanics of conducting research and implementation of various strategies of pest management. Multinational and national companies engaged in the promotion and sale of pesticides also need such graduates; since they are not yet available, said employers have no choice

but to train first the research-oriented applicants in the practical aspects of pest control before they are fully hired. Bome agricultural schools, on the other hand, do very minimal research and thus would prefer someone who had taken more courses in plant protection and allied fields to be able to teach more formal crop protection courses. They would also favor one who will be familiar with practical application of control measures.

It can be gleaned from the aforementioned reasons that our graduates are not adequately prepared for the other jobs mentioned. As such, they have to do a lot of self-study in order to be qualified for the position. There appears to be a need then to prepare students in that particular area. It should be pointed out also that some students would actually prefer a job which does not involve a great deal of research, and if given the choice will opt for a training under a non-thesis scheme. In this regard, it should be mentioned that lack of research interest on the part of the student is one of the reasons why thesis research sometimes takes a longer time to finish.

The Department of Plant Protection would like to propose, therefore, the offering of a non-thesis option for majors in Plant Protection in addition to the existing thesis option.

The courses proposed to be taken by the students in the new option are listed in Appendix A. In lieu of thesis, students in that scheme will take additional courses in Plant Protection

and undertake a field practice. They can also select other courses in their major field and in other departments for the Elective Courses. It is noteworthy to mention that the Regional Crop Protection Center and Warner Barnes, among others, have agreed to accept students who will undergo field practice in pest control. The Plant Pest Clinic of the Department can also provide students the needed training in pest diagnosis.

It is envisioned that apprenticeship will provide the students with good practical training in pest control. If trained in the Plant Pest Clinic, for example, the students will diagnose pest problems of farmers and researchers and provide solutions to those problems, under the direct supervision of the subject matter specialist. During epidemics, they will assist the department staff in the implementation of appropriate control measures to contain the pest. Furthermore, the students will also be involved in the pest control operations of on-going research projects of the Department of Plant Protection.

It should be emphasized that with the proposed non-thesis option, it is not necessary to hire additional personnel to implement it.
